



Total Awards by Congressional Act









ESSER FUNDS

Elementary & Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds





ESSER I:

- 90% to public schools via Title formula
- 0.5% state administration
- 9.5% to low per student distribution schools (\$162.06/student)
- Included equitable services to private schools

ESSER II:

- 90% to public schools via Title formula
- 0.5% state administration
- 9.5% to low per student distribution schools (\$672.96/student)

ARP ESSER:


- 90% to public schools via Title formula (20% address learning loss)
- 10% State Reserve
 - 0.5% state administration
 - 5% address learning loss
 - 1% summer enrichment.
 - I% afterschool programs

ESSER FUNDS – ALLOWABLE USES

May 2021 <u>USDE FAQs</u>:

- "...work to return to and safely sustain in-person instruction, address the educational inequities that have been exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, and address students' social, emotional, mental health, and academic needs."
- "These Federal emergency resources are available for a wide range of activities to address diverse needs arising from or exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, or to emerge stronger post-pandemic..."



of schools reported most students attended in-person instruction







Schools that offered full-time virtual learning




COVID-19 Cases* Within South Dakota K-12 Schools


